

OCWR SB1383 Infrastructure Saga

1989

AB 939 passes CA Integrated Waste Management Act requires all jurisdictions to divert 50% of waste from landfills

Key legislation

milestones

2011 AB 341 passes Commercial recycling requires 75% diversion by 2020.

AB 1826 passes Commercial organics recycling requires statewide commercial recycling: 75% goal by 2020.

2014

AB 1594 passes

credit for green waste; changes status of PGM to disposal.

SB 1383 passes Methane reduction and edible food recovery. Recover 20% of edible food by 2022; enforcement

2016

begins in 2024.

Eliminates diversion

SB 619 passes March 1, 2022, jurisdictions who met certain conditions were allowed to come into SB 1383

compliance without being subject to penalties by CalRecycle.

AB 1201 passes

2021

Prohibits sale of plastic products labeled as "compostable" or "home compostable" unless product meets ASTM compostability standard by January 1, 2026.

SB 343 passes

Beginning January 1, 2024, only products meeting statewide recyclability criteria can utilize the chasing arrows symbol.

AB 1985 passes Implemented delayed enforcement for procurement targets and phased in organics procurement targets (35% on or after Jan 1, 2023, 65% on or after Jan. 1, 2024, & 100% on or after Jan. 1, 2025).


AB 1857 passes

2022

Repeals the provision authorizing the inclusion of not more than 10% of the diversion through transformation.

SB 54 passes

Prohibits producers of single-use, disposable packaging or single-use. disposable food service ware products from offering for sale distributing or importing in or into the state.



OCWR – Overview



- IWMD/OCWR Established in 1940's
- 20 closed sites, 4 HHW's, 11 Franchise Agreements
- Operate 3 Active landfills (1960, 1976, 1990)
- Rich culture of landfilling history
- SB1383 created need for infrastructure & industry experts

- Compost facilities plan (2020, 2021, 2022)





Organic Recycling Infrastructure Plan – Phase 2



Co-Digestion (Food Waste)

- Use of existing capacity in WWTP (OC San District)
- SSO processed to remove contamination, homogenize, direct inject into AD (OCWR Operations)
- Benefits of increased digester efficiency
 - Biogas production increase & biosolids destruction
- Requires SSO (commercial program)
 - Requires volume (WDA)
- Bridging Solid Waste and Wastewater Industries
 - Use of conversion technology



Organic Recycling Infrastructure Plan – Phase 3



- High Solids Anaerobic Digestion (Program driven)
 - Larger investment and infrastructure
 - Need for secure volume for long term (WDA)
 - Mass Balance
 - Gas, liquids and solids:
 - Provides RNG for pipeline/fuels/energy
 - Digestate liquids management
 - Biosolids for composting/land applications
 - Continuous process
 - Market driven by legislation and lack of infrastructure



Legislative Supported Needed to Expand Organics Infrastructure



- Organic Processing Facilities as Essential Public Facilities
 - Critical to meet the statewide organic diversion goals
 - Reduce the need to obtain emission reduction credits which are scarce and expensive
- Permit Processing Coordination
 - Increase collaboration amongst permitting agencies
 - Reduce permitting timeframes
- Support Local Market Development
 - CalRecycle can't do it alone
 - Increase coordination amongst state and local agencies to promote organic product utilization
